President Pohamba said that he was happy that the elections went well, a demonstration that

Namibia had the capacity to hold free and fair elections. The President said that SWAPO Party's newly elected councilors should hit the ground running to implement undertakings made during the campaign and development policies and

programmes outlined in the 2009 SWAPO Party Election Manifesto.

production in the next four years.

The Minister was also confident that royalty from mines would increase considerably in line with the number of mining licences issued during the year 2010, in addition to exist-

ing ones.

Namibia is currently considered as the world-class producer of rough diamonds, uranium oxide, special high-grade zinc and acid-grade fluorspar as well as a producer of gold bullion, blister copper, lead, zinc concentrate, salt and is soon to produce cement.

The uranium industry has also picked up. Rossing Ura-

nium and Langer Heinrich production was reported to have increased due to their completion of the phases of expansion.

"The combined output of both mines allowed Namibia to cement its position as the world's fourth largest uranium producing country, and with that we expect to become the world's third largest uranium producing country within the next few years," said Minister Katali.

"I wish to inform the public that the future, and in particular, the year 2011 looks more promising than 2010."
