At the centre is a white Canadian woman who had gone throw a Canadian adoption agency to take a two months' old baby girl from the yet undisclosed Region of Namibia to British Columbia in Canada. The cultural and ethical questions have not been considered in the court which we now know as Judge Mainga's court (his own property). The article further does not inform us the readers whether the Namibian Government or officials have traveled to Canada to assess the mental or economic status of the prospective mother. Also it is common knowledge that Canada is home to many Native Americans who are languishing in poverty, and sure those children also need Biblical com-

passion to adopt them. Or did Judge Mainga assess all these facts before he became aggressive in the court of the Namibian Government, surely it has never and will be his private property. What we know is that the wheels of justice always run slow how comes this particular of Judge Mainga's court running so far in the absence of empirical proof that this adoption has been endorsed by for instance the traditional leader in the village where the baby is being taken from?

Therefore we must call for a moratorium and immediately Parliament must enact new laws and not these antiquated colonial laws on our shelves.
