As Namibians prepare for the upcoming Presidential and National Assembly elections, the battle of ideas is heating up. While SWAPO Party is fine-tuning its 2009 Election Manifesto, which will be launched on September 6, next month, some, if not all, opposition parties are in secret talks once again trying to form a coalition whose sole objective is to dent SWAPO Party's two-thirds majority in the National Assembly.

If there is one thing opposition parties have in common and which temporarily unites them, it is their dream to at least just wake up one day and be told that SWAPO Party has lost its two-thirds majority. That dream, too, forms the symbiotic relationship between them and the main stream of Eurocentric media houses in this country, which have been frantically singing hyperboles about Namibia's democracy, which, they claim, was under threat by SWAPO Party's dominance on Namibia's political landscape.

In churning out such antics, this assortment of uppity whites and celebrated master puppeteers, who only yesterday, were quite happy and comfortable to dine and wine with the racist oppressors, they are joined, once again, by an assortment of some pseudo academics, blacks and whites, who spend most of their time conducting academic research on how and why SWAPO Party's two-thirds majority is "not good" for democracy, and that it borders on a "de facto one party system."

More than once, however, their research papers have only achieved the opposite—strengthening SWAPO Party's strong-base throughout the country. Even if those academics and former puppets were to combine and form a coalition, which would not last anyway because there is nothing that binds them together, such a coalition will only achieve the opposite. People will simply look at it as an elitist contempt for popular judgment.

Namibians have voted over the years and have unequivocally said that they would put their trust in SWAPO Party. Their confidence in SWAPO Party is not about to change. It will be repeated, come November this year. Let the opportunists, celebrated puppets and pseudo academics lose faith in popular judgments if they so wish, but they should also rise above their egos and political ambitions and be honest and smart enough to accept that the results of free and fair democratic elections are not to be questioned. For, doing so means negating the very values and acid principles of the democracy they claim to uphold.

In fact, it would be a blessing in disguise if these former puppets and the current crop of malcontents and turncoats, who now proclaim their loyalty to Western liberal values, could come together as a coalition so that SWAPO Party could just finish them at a go, rather than wasting our scarce resources facing a plethora of fragmented opposition parties.

Current efforts to revive talks about forming a coalition should be marked as evidence that none of the current opposition parties, old and new, has any hope of mounting a serious political challenge to SWAPO Party in the upcoming elections. That painful reality is now closing in on them, albeit a little bit late.

Shortly after its formation in late 2007, the Rally for Democracy and Progress, RDP, thought it would draw the attention of other opposition parties into buying the idea of a coalition. In fact some parties such as the DTA, the All People's Party, APP, and the Republican Party, RP, nearly bought the idea, but following RDP's humiliating electoral defeats at Eenhana and Omuthiya in Ohangwena and Oshikoto regions respectively, they moved back after realizing that they were merely dealing with a spent cartridge, glorified only by Hidipo Hamutenya's exaggerated popularity and indispensability in SWAPO Party.

For now, the coalition talks are off, for now at least. Political opportunism rarely pays. It is one thing to pursue a cause driven by genuine convictions which are informed by a felt-need for fundamental social and economic changes that will have a positive impact on the lives of the very people one seeks to lead.

It is quite another when such convictions are driven by self-serving egos and unrestrained ambitions. Such projects, however disguised they may be, rarely get off the ground. They flop because they are not anchored on such felt-needs and hard-rock realities.

The other day I saw APP's Ignatius Shixwameni addressing a "star rally" in a hall, which looked more like an evening church choir than a "star rally." The hall was virtually empty, save for the many empty chairs which were quite visible in the background, and yet Shixwameni had the gut to say they would "stay the course!"

Opposition parties must by now realize that their "long-march" to State House, even if they combine, has been knocked off balance. Only a fool who believes in fantasies and pipedreams will dispute this reality. Even some well-known hibernators have now started saying that RDP was "too early in coming."

Sources say that Hamutenya is quite uncomfortable going it alone as RDP, and is currently arm-reaching parties like the Republican Party, RP and the DTA, but his confidantes fear that cobbling former puppets and yesteryear's "meneer" together into a coalition of some sorts to contest an election and hope to win is an exercise in futility.

For, beyond their hatred against SWAPO Party, there is nothing they will show, rainbow style, to attract the voters. That is for sure. Morally also, it will be impossible for RDP to lead the show. What has it brought on the table, political carcasses from Eenhana and Omuthiya? With only a mere three months to go before the elections, only a political buffoon will entertain coalition talks.
