With only five months to go before the Regional Council and Local Authority elections, SWAPO Party must really act firmly and decisively to restore order and discipline in the rank and file of the Party. This is too crucial a time to allow for petty differences to ruin and damage the image of the Party in the eyes of the public.

The Party has come a long way and should lead from the front in body and soul. Problems in Hardap Region need thorough investigation, and those who have erred must be shown the exit door and get marching orders without mercy.

I personally believe that there are bigger people behind some of these problems and this, too, must be thoroughly investigated and the culprits dealt with once and for all.

We had similar situations in Okahandja, Otjozondjupa Region, a few years ago, where some individuals from the Party leadership really thought they were bigger and stronger than the Party itself. They placed their interests above those of the Party and nearly caused havoc and anarchy in the membership and leadership.

These were simple individuals who took advantage of their connections within the leadership and started defying Party instructions. But in Okahandja the leadership moved fast and firmly whipped them into order. Those who refused to follow and obey leadership instructions left the Party.

Nobody begged them to stay on. It did not take us long before we realized that the man who was behind such people was none other than Hidipo Hamutenya, who has now defected from SWAPO Party and formed the Rally for Democracy and Progress, RDP.

He was carelessly using such people to advance his selfish presidential ambitions, which were spectacularly crushed at the 2004 Extra-ordinary Congress, which saw President Hifikepunye Pohamba eventually winning to become SWAPO Party Presidential Candidate during the 2004 Presidential and National Assembly elections, which both President Pohamba and SWAPO Party again won overwhelmingly.

The same thing again happened in Okahandja early this year when Ben Katamila defied Party instructions, arrogantly telling the leadership right in its face that he “would not budge.” He was shown the exit door, firmly and decisively. Where he is today is history. That is what leadership is all about.

What is right must be defended. What is wrong must be equally condemned with the contempt it deserves. The Party cannot allow loose canons to weaken SWAPO Party from within. Indiscipline and anarchy are not alternatives. They are a recipe for disaster. We should not lose focus of the fact that there are vultures waiting in the wings to exploit such differences for their own political advantages.

SWAPO Party cannot entertain such nonsense. It is better to lead and look after a small but disciplined flock than to have a large flock pulling in different directions and going astray. Let us find out what really is going on in Hardap Region and deal with it firmly, once and for all. I won't be surprised if the Hardap debacle resembles what had happened in Okahandja.

After all, 2012 is not really very far for some power-hungry individuals. They will always be the first in the race, sprinting when there are no contenders. As SWAPO Party Secretary General, Cde Pendukeni Iivula-Ithana, has said, there is no vacancy yet for people to start campaigning. We should work hard and face the upcoming Regional Council and Local Authority elections as a united team and cross the succession bridge when we come to it.
